Why vote?

As a UK citizen, you have the right to vote. Voting is one of the ways you can make your voice heard on issues that matter to you. By voting, you can tell your elected representatives what you think about the job they are doing.

Decisions are made on your behalf every day. These range from decisions on local issues like what is happening in your schools and colleges, to national issues like healthcare and education and global issues like defence and the environment. Voting allows people in many kinds of groups to decide who should make these decisions. It also allows them to choose which person or political party they feel should control their local council and central Government.

In order to vote you must be a British or European Citizen who is resident in the UK and on the Electoral Register. You can find out if you are on the electoral register by contacting your council's Electoral Services Office.

Unless you have asked for a postal vote, you will get a poll card with details of the voting date, times and place where you should go to vote. You must go to the polling station shown on your card. You cannot vote anywhere else. You must take your poll card with you when you go to vote. If you can't get to your polling station you might be able to post your vote or to give consent for someone else

(a proxy) to vote for you. You have to register for a postal or proxy vote with your local council. You can ask at your council's Electoral Services Office for an application form.
