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Even public transport is affected by anti-social behaviour.

Merseyrail has decided to target passengers who put their feet on seats in their trains. Security staff were given CCTV Head Cams to record pictures and sound which could be used as evidence for possible prosecution in the Magistrates Court. The idea was to prevent anti-social behaviour and keep trains pleasant for passengers.

There was a poster campaign to make people aware of the issue and to give passengers time to change their habits to prevent them being taken to court. The director of Merseyrail, Patrick Verwer, said, "We have listened to our

passengers. We will not tolerate anti-social behaviour in any form on our trains and putting your feet on our seats is an irritating and unhygienic habit that we want to put a stop to."

The chair of Merseytravel, Councillor Mark Dowd, said, "We are taking action to deal with this problem. We've spent more than £32 million refurbishing the trains and we don't want the seats being ruined. People who put their feet on seats are being anti-social. Other passengers don't want to sit on a seat covered in mud or dirt and they shouldn't have to."

Read through this passage about the dangers of road rage and use the information to answer the questions that follow.

Road rage is becoming more and more common on our roads and motorways. Road rage incidents have led to assault, injury and, although rare, death. Motorway madness can result in multiple pile-ups involving many vehicles.

To avoid getting caught up in such an incident, try to drive with care, keep your distance and try not to look straight at other drivers. If somebody does something that annoys you, do not make gestures or react angrily. Doing so could put you and anybody travelling with you in a very unsafe place, so it is vital to stay calm.

Most people get mad at times – it's human nature – but you should try to avoid rousing the anger of someone who sees the road as a gladiator pit. As hard as it may be, try not to respond to other people's gestures or threats. They are already wound up so you aren't going to make the situation any better by giving as good as you get. That other driver doesn't know you and, as they probably drive like that all of

the time, you most likely don't want to know them!

Remember – no matter how in control you feel, by responding to an aggressive driver, you allow yourself to be controlled by them. You're a victim of their behaviour which you're allowing to mess with your head.

Here is some advice on how to act if you are unlucky enough to be tackled by another driver:

- Keep your doors locked.
- · Keep your windows closed.
- Stay in your car.
- Make a note of what the driver looks like and his or her car registration number.
- Make sure there is enough space between your car and the car in front to drive away if you need to.
- As soon as you can, and as safely as you can, get away from the aggressive driver.
- When it is safe to do so, call the police with a description of the driver and details of the car.

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


